
We have learned so much this year and we have enjoyed watching the children grow and make new friends.

Later in March we transitioned into all things St. Patrick's Day! The kids created beautiful art. During the month of April, we enjoyed talking about Easter, spring, and insects. #### The Lion Class



Cat, Mat, Sat, Fat, and Rat - I bet you can guess where I am going with this...Dr. Seuss! We began the month of March finishing up our unit on Dr. Seuss and rhyming. We continued to practice rhyming during circle time and we loved hearing some of the real and made-up words the Lions came up with. Along with rhyming, we are working on learning syllables during circle time. As you probably know, during circle time we count our days of school to help learn place value and counting. The Lions have been very excited about our "100thDay of School". To celebrate this day, we made T-shirts with 100 fingerprint dots and did 100 exercises in groups of 10. The Lions made headbands to wear and we had a day of fun recognizing that 100 is a lot of anything! Following Dr. Seuss and our 100<sup>th</sup> day of school, we had a week of St. Patrick's Day fun. We read some fun stories about Leprechauns and rainbows. The Leprechaun visited our classroom and we had a scavenger hunt around the school. We concluded our hunt with Lucky Charms and Shamrock Shakes for snack. The Lions had a blast buying sweets with gold at our Shamrock Sweet Shop for dramatic play. We had many fun rainbow projects during this unit - a favorite being a collage rainbow. We learned the science behind rainbows and read many fiction and nonfiction books about rainbows. Before Spring Break we had a guick author study reading the books of Leo Lionni.

Following St. Patrick's Day and the 100<sup>th</sup> Day of school we moved into our unit on Fairytales and Folktales. We discussed the elements of a Fairytale and how it is different from a Folktale. As well, we discussed that these are stories that are repeated over and over again throughout time. We read different versions of several stories showing how the same story can be told with a different twist by different authors. The Lions wrote another writing prompt on why they are special and decorated mirrors with a self-portrait. I always love hearing what the kids come up with when they speak their minds. The class made castle suncatchers, princess and the pea beds (counting the mattresses), castles made from shapes and a Goldilocks emergent reader. They had a lot of make-believe fun dressing up in the dramatic play center and playing with castles in the block center.

We have introduced the Lions to chapter books! We started the Mercy Watson series that my own children loved when they were little. They are a great introduction to chapter books since they have short chapters and include a few introductions.

We will spend the first week in April talking about Easter. Currently we are focusing on Eric Carle since his stories fit perfectly with spring! We hope you have a wonderful and safe spring break. We look forward to hearing about many adventures when our Lions return.

## The Discovery Room "Where no discovery is too small"



How does the solar system hold up its pants? With an asteroid belt, of course! Learning about the two belts within our solar system (the other belt is called Kuiper) is just one example of the plethora of astronomical facts students discovered throughout March. We began our unit focusing on the day/ night cycle and planetary characteristics. We read Nelson's <u>Day and Night</u> book, which clarified a popular student idea that the sun turns off or gets too tired to keep running in the evening. We conducted a mini experiment using a flashlight and foam earth ball to demonstrate where the light shines as earth rotates on its axis. Students practiced critical thinking skills by justifying why it is better to do certain activities at night or during daytime. I was really impressed by the depth of conversation generated by this unit. Students even learned to differentiate between the frequently confused twenty-four-hour rotation versus yearly revolution. The moon was introduced with Gail Gibbon's fact filled <u>The Moon Book</u>. Students practiced identifying and ordering the moon's phases. We concluded the unit with a popular bottle rocket experiment which uses a plastic snap top film canister containing a shaken mixture of water and antacid tablets placed upside down on pavement. The one rule after you shake it is to run and watch what happens! By the conclusion of this unit students could easily identify and order all eight planets with the help of the following famous acrostic: My very eager mother just served us nachos.

The final week of March we decided to 'bug out' with an entomology unit which will continue throughout April. The students were immersed in the insect experience from books, to stations, to art, and even hands-on insect experiences. The students discovered that insects have six legs, three main body parts, two antennae, an exoskeleton, and most have wings. We learned about how butterfly wings are symmetrical by folding splattered paper to observe the same pattern copied on both sides. Did you know that insects use their antennae or feelers to touch, taste, hear, and even smell? We played with plastic bug scenes, insect versus non-insect sorting containers, insect puzzles, felt scenes, and examined insect slides under a microscope. If you ask at home, each student can probably regale you with a 'head, thorax, abdomen' song to the tune of "Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes." The next few weeks of this unit focused on life cycles. The students sorted the life cycles of butterflies, beetles, ants, and even frogs! They enjoyed using plastic versions of these animals and accompanying charts to sort each life cycle in the proper order. To reinforce the order, students completed oversize ant, butterfly, ladybird beetle, and frog life cycle foam puzzles. Students created aluminum foil lily pads and tested how many frogs could float in a mini pond using STEM skills they learned in the previous machines unit. Two containers of caterpillars arrived in the mail and we watched them grow over the course of two weeks from tiny larvae to giant pupae wrapped in chrysalis. The pupae were transferred to the butterfly habitat containment and we look forward to releasing butterflies as soon as they emerge. We spent the final week of our insect unit specifically focused on ants, bees, and non-insect arthropods, including spiders and worms. Students gained new respect for ants and bees after learning about their complex social structures and how they have more in common with us than we thought. The book Hey, Little Ant by Phillip and Hannah Moose imparts the critical message that it is important to care about all creatures, big or small. In Discovery, students played the honeybee tree game, placed tiny bees on flowers to pollinate them, and explored an interactive garden complete with dirt, ants, and even lifelike gelatinous worms hidden throughout the display. They used packing foam and pipe cleaners to create their own anatomically correct ants. The unit culminated with each class going on a bug hunt complete with their own bug containers, tweezers, and checklists. Students caught worms, ants, millipedes, larva, and beetles. My favorite part was observing how fearlessly and respectfully the students collected specimens. Of course, all the animals were released back into the wild after students took turns sharing their finds.

During May we will explore the topic of weather and the water cycle before recapping favorite units throughout the year. Please mark your calendars and save the date for April 27<sup>th</sup>–Science Night! I look forward to seeing everyone immerse themselves in various science units we completed throughout the year and some new bonus experiments! Thank you for sharing your little learners with me. They never cease to amaze me with the immense amount of knowledge they are capable of absorbing and retaining!

Beanbags, Lummi Sticks and Circle Games

The music room started out the month of April with an entire week of beanbags. We balanced the beanbags on our heads, fingers, feet and backs. We used bean bags as pillows and washcloths. We shook them in time to music and danced around with them in our arms as our dance partners. Who knew bean bags could be so many different things in one week?!

Next up in the month was Lummi Stick week. Lummi sticks are two sticks, one textured and one smooth, that are tapped or rubbed together to make sound. I use Lummi Sticks to teach rhythm and directional instructions such as forward, back, side and under. When handing out any instrument, the students practice using 3 and 4 step directional instructions, which is a lot for 4 and 5 year olds They did great at remembering the steps and following them in order!

As the year comes to an end, we will have a week-long camping unit and play circle games with various instruments found in the music room. The older kids will also learn a song for the Transition ceremony.
